Our vision Our hope is to **create justice** and respond to injustice at the personal, social and structural levels in society, including government, church and business. Our mission To respond to people who experience exclusion, poverty, injustice and social isolation so that they may experience inclusion, economic wellbeing, justice and connection within their community of choice.

Guiding principles In responding to individuals, families, groups, communities and institutions, we believe that every adult and child has the right to:

- a home, an income, healthcare, education, safety, dignity and connection with their community of choice
- access to a broad range of personal, social, intellectual, economic and spiritual resources for personal and community wellbeing
 resources to enable restoration of relationships with self, family, community, social and religious institutions.
- forums to participate in decisions which impact on their lives at an individual, social and structural level
- **equity**, acknowledging the impact of age, gender, economic status, disability, sexual orientation, culture and religious belief



• **opportunities** for processes that redress past and/or present experiences of neglect and abuse

- Micah Projects endorses the United Nations Declaration of Human Rights.
- We acknowledge the **Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples of Australia** as the traditional owners of this land and support the right of Indigenous people to self determination and cultural expression.

LEADERSHIP STATEMENT

Micah Projects was originally formed as a social justice initiative of the St Mary's Catholic community in South Brisbane (now an independent faith community). The community's vision to create a not-for-profit organisation was influenced by a desire to create a collective response to social justice.

Over a two year community consultation period many factors influenced the vision to create justice and respond to injustice including:

- Over-representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people who were homeless on the streets of Brisbane
- The increase of rough sleepers around the church and parish home
- Requests for assistance by people seeking justice from abuse by clergy and religious organisations
- Issues of domestic violence, sexual assault and women's equality
- De-institualisation of people living with disability and mental illness.

It was from this position that Micah Projects first made its unswerving commitment to

social justice. We were named for the prophet Micah from the Jewish tradition, whose words represent our vision for a world in which we can support our efforts together to "act justly, love tenderly and walk humbly." We believe these three principles are in common with all people striving for a world that supports the dignity of each human being and a just society.

Micah Projects was incorporated in 1995, and we are now well established as an independent community organisation, which continues to grow as we provide services across the Brisbane metropolitan region. By the 2012/2013 financial year, we were providing support to 3530 adults and 1114 children, and recorded almost 52 000 casual contacts with people for information, referral, transport and financial assistance.

Our support and advocacy services to individuals and families remain underpinned by our steadfast dedication, focus and determination to deliver on our social justice mandate.

OUR STRATEGIC APPROACH

Use a proactive approach to reach people where they are on the streets and in their homes

At Micah Projects we believe that it is as important to prevent homelessness as it is to manage its effects. By proactively supporting those who are vulnerable, supporting them to access housing and sustain a tenancy, and to stabilise their health, we know we will be supporting people to a position of strength in their lives which will reduce their risk of homelessness.



Create partnerships and opportunities for collaboration

We believe that by working in partnership and collaboration with other organisations, the people with whom we are engaged will have greater access to services, resources and opportunity in the community. Whether by pooling resources, addressing service gaps, adopting a multi-disciplinary approach to an issue, or providing integrated support to vulnerable people through a single service, we will continue to enhance our existing partnerships and identify opportunities for new collaborations.

Establish accessible hubs which connect people to services and resources

By working together with a range of organisations and services in one place, Micah Projects believes we can provide a more integrated and effective response to the needs of vulnerable people. Over the next two years we will build on the service hubs already in place, to further co-locate services at the Brisbane Homelessness Service Centre, the Wellspring Hub for Families and Children, Brisbane Common Ground, Trinity Place and Caterpillar House.

Evaluate, innovate and adapt

At Micah Projects, we believe that we should always be confident that what we're doing is making a difference, and that we should always seek to improve the services we deliver. Our programs and services will continue to be based on evidence and best practice in the field; we will continue to develop and advocate for new initiatives across our services; and we will continue to evaluate all of our activities.

Consumer, citizen and community engagement

Micah Projects seeks to break social isolation by cultivating a culture of acceptance, integration and shared endeavour, and by allowing people the opportunity for their voice to be heard. We aim to broaden the participation of interested people from the community, by providing a context for them to learn about and make connections to our work, to contribute to what we do or to advocate for change. We know that by establishing networks of people with shared experiences and seeking feedback from users of our services, we can better respond to the needs and expectations of those with whom we engage.

OUR GOALS AND OBJECTIVES

Micah Projects is committed to breaking social isolation and building community with the most vulnerable individuals, families and children in our communities. We will do this by working with children, their families, and vulnerable adults to ensure:

Children, families and vulnerable adults have a home which is safe, secure and affordable.

To achieve this we will:

- Prevent homelessness among individuals, families and children by enabling access to resources and services to ensure safety in their home and a sustainable tenancy in affordable housing
- Provide **assertive outreach** to individuals, families and children who are living in cars, on the street and in parks, to end homelessness, one person, one family at a time
- Provide triage and diversion services to individuals and families who are homeless, by assessment and referral to

• Provide **community education**, events and services to communicate that domestic and family violence is never

To achieve this we will:

03

- Deliver services through **partnerships**, and create **multi**disciplinary teams for an integrated response to housing, healthcare and community services with people who are vulnerable and/or homeless, living with disability and or mental illness
- Provide integrated, multi-disciplinary services to young pregnant and parenting women and their children, at the Early Years Hub, Caterpillar Place
- Create a community-based **Health Centre** through partnerships with St Vincent's Private Hospital, Brisbane, Mater Health Services, Greater Metro South Brisbane Medicare Local, Metro North Brisbane Medicare Local and the Institute of Urban Indigenous Health. The Centre will focus on integrating primary healthcare, mental health and addiction care, coordination and discharge planning with vulnerable people, chronic disease management, preventive health and treatment of acute disease.

Vulnerable adults are supported to sustain their personal recovery, stability and community connections.

To achieve this we will:

- Work with individuals living in level 3 supported accommodation facilities seeking assistance with their **personal** goals and plans to support their wellbeing
- Provide information and access to resources supporting individual wellbeing and understanding of their personal journey
- Enhance services to people who have persistent and chronic mental illness by working together with the Partners in Recovery Consortium led by Greater Metro South Brisbane Medicare Local
- Ensure the workforce is trained to support people within a **recovery and trauma informed practice** framework
- Provide opportunities for peer support and education with people experiencing mental illness
- Assist people in the management of their personal healthcare activities
- Sustain **community connections** and a home with people living with disability.

Infants and toddlers have their developmental needs met within the family and community, and children and young people are engaged in school and/or training.

To achieve this we will:

- Deliver **early childhood programs** that ease the impact on children's wellbeing of adversity and trauma
- Engage with young pregnant and parenting women early to promote stability and to prevent removal of children to out-ofhome care at birth
- Work in partnership with parents to **achieve their aspirations** with their children
- Ensure **child aware practices**, risk assessment and appropriate child services are provided within the organisation, the family and community.

Family functioning, safety and stability is strengthened in order to support family preservation in healthy, safe and secure family environments.

To achieve this we will:

- Work with parents to care for and protect their children in **safe and healthy relationships** through improved parenting skills, confidence and capacities
- Mitigate the impacts of **poverty**, **adversity and trauma** through practical support, referral, planned support and advocacy in accessing services, resources and opportunity in the community
- Provide services to **prevent removal of children and support reunification** when removal occurs.

Children, families and vulnerable adults have access to financial assistance and economic opportunities. To achieve this we will:

- Resolve homelessness by providing **financial assistance** to access housing and establish a home
- Provide financial assistance to **ensure safety**, **sustain tenancy and access services** in the community
- Provide integrated, planned support for employment and training through the Jobs Network and Family Support Teams
